Dr. Nelsen called the meeting to order and stated that a quorum was present. He reported that the requirements of the Freedom of Information Act with respect to this meeting had been met. The Commission members were given the opportunity to discuss the items on the Consent Agenda. The minutes of the February 6, 2019, ETV Commission Meeting were approved. Dr. Nelsen welcomed David Vipperman back to the Commission.

Julie Lonon gave the report of the ETV Endowment. She said that overall, at this point, membership is 4% ahead of budget. She reported that on-air, telemarketing, and e-newsletters fund raising is trending behind. The One State, Many Voices: Sharing South Carolina's Stories campaign is less than \$100,000 away from the goal of \$1.6 million—53 pledges totaling \$930,537 and planned gifts totaling \$570,846. A public roll-out is being planned. An event with Walter Edgar's Journal was held in the South Carolina Public Radio studios in which Legacy Society donors watched a taping; a discussion followed. Upcoming events include a SC Lede live event in Florence on March 28th and one in Rock Hill on April 11th. Two screenings for Reconstruction: America AfterThe Civil War are planned – Charleston on April 4th and Beaufort on April 5th. Three screenings are planned for Les Miserables – Charleston (College of Charleston) on March 28th; Columbia (ETV) on .April 10th; Greenville (Michelin North

America) on April 10th. The *Spoleto Chamber Music Series* "Meet and Greet" will be held in Charleston at the Spoleto Headquarters on May 15th. The Endowment is engaged in direct donor outreach through thank-you notes; thank you calls/emails; visits; event RSVPs; tickets; and planned giving interactions. The Endowment overall retention rate is 72%.

Emily Heatwole, representing the State Department of Education, reported that there are a number of education bills moving through the House of Representatives and the Senate. The House passed an education reform bill that was sent to the Senate. SDE was concerned about the functioning of the 0-20 Committee, but the Senate has taken that out of their version of the bill. SDE is also watching the section that addresses how SDE provides technical assistance to under performing schools. The Read to Succeed bill is moving through the process. Ms. Heatwole explained assessments and where it stands in the versions of the bill; a discussion followed.

The Commission moved into Executive Session to discussion contractual issues.

Following the Executive Session, Dr. Nelsen reported that the following Resolution was passed in Executive Session (4 affirmative votes; 1 abstention—Craig Kinley):

Resolved, that the ETV President and CEO shall seek to reach agreement with the ETV Endowment on a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that will incorporate the following "core principles" as required by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) and/or the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB), and will otherwise represent the interests of the ETV Commission:

- 1. All funds which have been or will be raised over-the-air on ETV's television and/or radio stations through pledge drives and similar activities that interrupt regular programming must be used only to support ETV's broadcast operations as determined by ETV.
- 2. ETV must maintain complete, accurate and secure records of all uses of donor information and must maintain active control of donor lists containing donor information that has been or will be obtained via ETV's over-the-air fundraising or via any other fund-raising conducted in the name of or for the benefit of ETV. This does not necessarily require that the ETV Endowment transfer possession of the lists to ETV, but the arrangement should acknowledge that the Endowment's possession and use of such donor information is on behalf of ETV as ETV's agent, is subject to, and will be in compliance with CPB requirements.
- 3. ETV must have the right to have an accounting of the source and use of all funds—past and future—raised using ETV's name. It must be agreed that any such funds will be expended by the ETV Endowment only for purposes that directly benefit ETV.

Further Resolved, that the ETV President and CEO is directed to take any necessary legal and institutional steps to ensure compliance with the requirements of the FCC and/or the CPB, and the directives of the ETV Commission.

Anthony Padgett gave the report of the Office of the President. ETV has been working to increase awareness around workforce development within the State and draw attention to areas

of industry that could benefit from an increased workforce. ETV's efforts for this began with a series of video concepts generated from the ETV Advisory Council (Mack Bailey with support from David Vipperman). These video segments were produced at the Spartanburg regional studio. Workforce clips were shown. Mr. Padgett continued by stating that, as the awareness project evolves, it is anticipated that a web presence will be created to coordinate resource materials and provide additional information about various career paths. ETV staff are working with the Department of Education and the Department of Commerce to keep them informed about the project and staff have been invited to attend their ongoing conversations around workforce development in the State. A discussion followed.

Mr. Padgett reported that in April PBS will air Henry Louis Gates, Jr's (host of *Finding Your Roots*) new four-hour documentary series *Reconstruction: America After The Civil War*. The series explores the transformative years following the American Civil War when the nation struggled to rebuild itself in the face of profound loss, massive destruction and revolutionary social change. A clip from the series was shown. A sneak preview of the new mini-series will be shown in Beaufort at Tech of the Low Country on April 4th at 6:00 pm; immediately following the screening, there will be a panel discussion moderated by ETV's Beryl Dakers. On Friday, April 5, at ETV's Low Country studio, Dr. Gates will be part of a virtual classroom event, followed by a Reconstruction discussion and luncheon.

Mr. Padgett gave a spectrum funds and repack update (a copy of his power point presentation is attached). He reported that ETV benefitted from the FCC Spectrum Auction in 2017 and was authorized by the State to receive \$35 million of the proceeds. ETV intends to utilize these funds over the next 4-5 years to fund the mandatory repack of all 10 of the Network's television transmitters, advance aging infrastructure, and address other technical needs. Over the next several months ETV, along with thousands of other broadcasters across the country, will be going through the repack process. During this time, interruptions can be expected to both television and radio services caused by work that is required, as well as work that that others in the area are required to complete. ETV is working to proactively message and alert the audience about the interruptions and is preparing to provide customer support related to the process. Adrienne Fairwell, ETV's Vice of Communications, Underwriting, and Marketing, outlined the campaign that is being planned including a direct mail piece, a repack website, and social media.

Mr. Padgett reminded the Commissioners about the special event on April 24th at 5:30 pm in the ETV studios for *Women Vision SC*. Commissioners are invited to celebrate this year's eleven honorees.

Mr. Padgett updated the Commission on the TATA Business Concept, which is a cloud based service solution, offering a virtualized Master Control. Conversations with NETA (National Educational Telecommunications Association) to act as ETV's partner and business agent for this project did not materialize. New conversations have begun, with WUFT, ETV's partner for SCEIN, and with Public Media Company, a company specializing in providing

business solutions to public media stations, to address and identify future business models around ATSC 3.0 and other services. A discussion followed.

Dr. Nelsen gave the report of the Chairman. Dr. Nelsen and Mr. Padgett attended the APTS Public Media Summit in Washington. On Capitol Hill Day they met with Senator Scott, Representative Timmons, and the staffs of Representatives Norman, Clyburn, and Cunningham about public broadcasting funding. Dr. Nelsen reported that he has had conversations with Tommy Windsor in the Governor's Office about the need to fill the vacancies on the ETV Commission.







A National Broadband Plan was developed by the FCC to identify the country's spectrum need and an auction was suggested as a way to make more room for those wireless needs.








SCETV sent a Proviso to request for permission to participate in the upcoming spectrum auction.






The SC general assembly approved the submitted Proviso to allow SCETV to participate in the spectrum auction.

SCETV received a total of \$43,162,610 from the spectrum auction and retained \$35 million to pay for the FCC mandated repack initiative and support infrastructure including 600 towers across the state. Towers support education, public safety, emergency communications and broadcasting.


